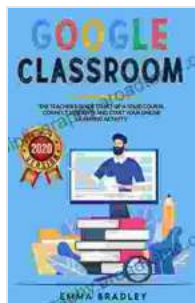

Once you have connected with students, you are ready to start your online classroom. The first day of class, you should introduce yourself and your course. You should also go over the course syllabus and expectations.

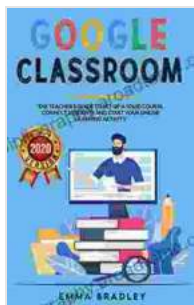

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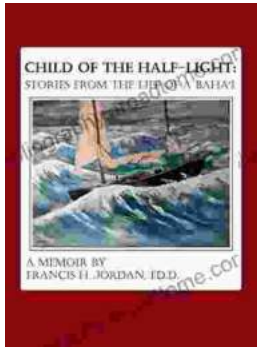
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
